News from Ben Perez, GTSFJ Program Director

Hello Friends:

What an exciting and energizing month we have had at Gather the Sprit for Justice! We just wrapped up our third Saturday in our new temporary location--First Church of the Brethren--and have expanded our breakfast menu; to the point where we probably need to consider renaming our Saturday event "Common Ground Breakfast" instead of "Common Ground Coffee!"

For the past three weeks, we have proudly featured pancakes, scrambled eggs and sausage links. This past Saturday we also incorporated grits into our menu--serving them with either butter and cheese, or sugar and/or syrup. On Saturday September 14th we had more than 200 people in the building! (170 guests and more than 30 volunteers.)

I want to extend a warm thank you to our dedicated volunteers, all of whom have really come through for us by arriving early and helping us find our rhythm in our new space. Additionally, a significant number of volunteers have been coming in during the day on Wednesdays to help organize and optimize our new space.

Finally, I'd like to thank our gracious hosts at First Church of the Brethren--especially Pastor Josiah, Pastor Lexi and Alan, Chair of the Building Resources Team--for making us and our guests feel so welcome! October will hopefully bring with it continued growth, as well as at least part of the long-anticipated expansion of our programming.

New Location

Due to ongoing plumbing issues at Christ Lutheran Church, the nearby First Church of the Brethren at 219 Hummel Street Harrisburg offered GTSFJ temporary use of its facilities to conduct our Saturday morning breakfasts, English classes and other activities. Attendance at the breakfasts has increased tremendously at our new location. We are less than a five-minute walk (0.2 miles) from our former location, so our familiar regulars attend.



And new attendees from among the First Church of the Brethren congregation and its neighbors have also been visiting. We are thrilled with the large dining space in the Brethren's fellowship hall and happy to add our activities to the array of services the Brethren offer to the community (e.g., a free clothing and household articles store, grocery distribution and children's activities). Because the last few weeks have been so productive, we are currently talking with the Brethren about a possible longer-term partnership. Stay tuned!

English as a Second Language (ESL) for Latinos Classwork

This story was written by ESL student Jennifer Lucero in response to a question asked in class: What are you most thankful for? She came to the U.S. about 12 months ago speaking very little English.

I am very grateful to have met so many good people in this country and it makes me very happy to share with people from so many places and learn from each of them. Because I have been very blessed since the first day I was able to be here, I think how can I not be grateful for all the things that have been presented to me during this year? My life changed. Now I have the opportunity to be here with you in this church where I was received with great affection. I have the honor of being able to call you friends. Without knowing it, the month of August 2023 brought me to a great place. I cannot say that everything has been joyful and beautiful because I have also had to go through bad days where I feel that trying hard is not working, and I miss so many things about my country such as speaking out loud. n this country I have had to lower my voice sometimes, but I know that Guatemala is not a safe place for me. Now I am fortunate to be able to fight every day for a better life and I can only tell you once again that God has been very good to me and my family. I am sure that I will still have many more things to be thankful for in the future.

ESL for French and Creole Speakers

To finish our class for the summer, we planned something special for the students and did a field trip to State Street to have a guided tour of Saint Patrick's Cathedral and another of the Pennsylvania Capitol Building. There were 20 adult students and a toddler who went on the tours with Andy Back and me. We walked about 30 minutes from Allison Hill down to the Capitol complex.



Father Brommer was our first guide and he graciously welcomed us into the church. He used very simple language and explained basic facts about the architecture of the church and of the stained-glass windows depicting the stories of Jesus. I did a French translation every few minutes so the students would be sure of what they heard.

I probed Father Brommer a bit to talk about the history of the congregation, about the Irish who came here because of extreme poverty and famine in their homeland, knowing that would resonate with many in the class. He spoke to that and then to the changes

in the makeup of the congregations and informed the class that currently there are other Haitians in the church. He welcomed them to come again, but without pressuring them.

After that we had a tour of the state capitol building. The students really loved being in the space. While we waited for our custom tour to start, some called their family back home and put their phones on video to show their family the beauty of the rotunda. In addition to the architecture, the tour guide spoke of Violet Oakley and her many paintings in the capitol. She was a young woman of 28-years-old when she received the commission to do these works of art at a time when women were not allowed in the capitol and not allowed to vote.



It was a positive day for the class with a lot of smiling faces on our walk back to Allison Hill.

Classes resumed September 14th and to our surprise, we had 38 students, almost double the number we had a month earlier. Many improvements are already underway to accommodate this increase and were noticeable during the September 21st classes. These include efforts to find us more space to work in small groups, efforts to incorporate technology into the classroom and show the students how they could use technology outside the class to improve their learning, efforts of volunteers to come early so they could screen the students to group them more appropriately by their abilities before the classes started and agreeing to stay later to help with a second class, and finally, by having more volunteers to work with smaller groups encouraging greater participation. and work on setup and cleanup! (Kathy Williams)












Photo IDs, Driver's Licenses, and Birth Certificates

We continue to assist neighbors in obtaining IDs, drivers' licenses and birth certificates. These vital documents are essential for applying for employment, cashing a check, requesting public assistance, driving, applying for housing, receiving medical care and accessing other services. While the documents are a necessity, the cost is prohibitive for the largely low-income population of Allison Hill. IDs and licenses cost from \$40.50 to \$42.50 and birth certificates cost \$20. In May, we provided checks for these documents to 23 neighbors, in June 37 checks, in July 39, and in August 37. Disbursements for the four months totaled \$5,116. (Ann Van Dyke and Brian DeBease)



Toiletries Update

The GTSFJ Common Ground Coffee now has a wonderful new space and we are distributing toiletries between 9 and 10 each Saturday to old and new customers in the Fellowship Hall. As Ben and his kitchen crew serve up fantastic breakfast fare, we currently distribute two items to each person from what has been generously donated. That may seem very little, but even two items can make a big difference for a low income or homeless friend. It's exciting to see all the new faces and learn new names.

As Toiletries is not a funded operation, my big news is we have just mailed close to forty packets to places of worship/civic organizations explaining our programs and asking them to consider running a one month Toiletries Drive. The packets contain toiletry lists, explain how easy it is, answer lots of Q&As, as well as providing contact information for those interested in volunteering for one the GTSFJ's other services. Fingers crossed, this could be step one in making our toiletries operation self-sustaining (our long time goal) and allow the distribution of a greater number and more diverse items to each customer. (Gail Ismart)



- Medical Outreach Clinic: The clinic is a free, nurse-run walk-in clinic that provides simple lab tests, basic physical assessments, and health education. Open Monday-Friday 10 am-2:30 pm. No appointments needed. 717-260-9320.
- Dental Clinic: Volunteer dentists, support staff and translators offer care 3 days a month for urgent dental conditions requiring simple extractions and fillings. No appointments, all walk-in, first-come-first-served, free of charge. Call to learn upcoming dates.
- Spiritual Care: Pastor Best offers spiritual care to church members, community residents and staff of partner organizations. Please let him know if you would like to talk about how he can provide spiritual care to you, your staff, or the members of your organization. Pastor Best will be in the Medical Outreach Clinic waiting area from 1:00-2:00 pm every Wednesday to chat.

Brethren Community Ministries: On August 24th, GTSFJ joined other local organizations and Allison Hill neighbors at the BCMPeace Block Party. Clay and Mike represented us by handing out treats and telling neighbors about our services. The blocki' party offered music, games (notice our beloved corn hole game behind the table!), arts and crafts, and food to help neighbors enjoy the end of summer and get ready for the start of school.
